Pr. David Brondos serves as professor at the Theological Community of Mexico, an ecumenical consortium of seminaries in Mexico City which includes Augsburg Lutheran Seminary. His work involves training pastors and leaders for churches throughout Mexico and also coordinating the Seminary's online course program that has students from all over Latin America.

A message from Missionary David Brondos "Preparing Leaders in Mexico

In some ways, teaching in a seminary setting here in Mexico City is a lot like teaching in a seminary in the United States. In other ways, however, it is very different. What is particularly unique is the school where I teach, the Theological Community of Mexico. Our students come from many different backgrounds. We have students and professors from a wide variety of churches, including not only Lutherans but Roman Catholics, mainline Protestants, and people from Pentecostal and independent churches. We also have students from different socio-economic backgrounds, including some who come from rural and indigenous settings."

- 3. Express whether one wants to demonstrate public commitment to God's mission to the world through the ministry of Christ the King Lutheran Church.


