#### **Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Services (LIRS):** Standing with and advocating for refugees and migrants

Reflecting American Lutherans' immigrant roots and commitment to welcoming strangers, Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Services has been a strong voice and champion for migrants and refugees around the world for nearly 80 years.

LIRS will receive the proceeds of our congregation's mission offering in June. At a time when some seek to undermine our nation's commitment to welcoming strangers, LIRS's advocacy and compassionate services are even more essential.

Around the world, nearly 65 million people have been forced to flee their homes because of war, violence and persecution—the greatest number since the end of World War II. More than 20 million are refugees who had to abandon their home country for life in camps in neighboring countries.

## LIRS works with four groups of people:

Refugees: In 2016, LIRS resettled more than 13,000 refugees.

Children: Since 2011, the United States has seen a growing number of children flee to the U.S. without any parent accompanying them. These children, primarily from El Salvador, Guatemala, and Honduras, are often fleeing gang violence, trafficking, threats, and extortion, as well as abuse, domestic violence, and poverty. Many are seeking to be reunified with family in the United States. In 2016, LIRS partners served more than 26,000 children and their families

Migrants: LIRS advocates on behalf of migrant and asylum-seeking men, women, and families impacted by immigration enforcement. They believe a person should never be locked up simply because of his or her immigration status or separated from their family members.

Travel Loan Expenses: When refugees are admitted to the United States, their travel is arranged under a loan program. Refugees agree to repay the loans. LIRS oversees the repayment process for the refugees they resettle.

## **Justice Advocacy Ministry:** Summer Book Review July 8, 9:45 a.m.

Undocumented: How Immigration Became Illegal by Aviva Chomsky, reviewed by Federico Salas-Isnardi

At a time of renewed hate speech and incendiary anti-immigrant rhetoric starting from the highest office of the land and repeated passionately by ethnocentric vociferous minorities, it is important to review the facts about immigration. One way to reclaim the immigrant story and offer a counter-narrative to the negative rhetoric is to try to understand the immigration system. On July 8, during the summer book review series, Federico Salas-Isnardi, a regular speaker on issues of immigration, citizenship, and social justice, will review Aviva Chomsky's 2014 book "Undocumented: How Immigration Became Illegal," which presents a comprehensive look at the history of our immigration system. Chomsky reviews milestones of the immigration story and points out that the concept of illegal immigration only came into existence 50 years ago. Chomsky presents a fascinating history of the immigration system and the social, economic, and moral implications of the current situation while creating a sympathetic view of immigrants and their plight. While she offers few solutions, she asks questions that must be answered. Join Federico on July 8 for a review of this book and a lively discussion.

#### **Toilet Tissue Collection for SEARCH**



The Way Home (Houston's collaborative, multi-agency effort to end homelessness) has helped decrease Houston's homeless population by half since 2011. However, even as more people are being moved into housing, they still have real needs for food and household items. When asked recent-

ly by one of our CTK volunteers at the Perry St. Apartments (New Hope Housing), SEARCH Homeless Services social worker Bill Taube noted that toilet paper the most frequently requested household item.

A recent study out of the University of Michigan's Ross School of Business found that poor people spend more on toilet paper than rich people do. But the reasons behind the trend extend to other household items, and further demonstrate how it's actually expensive to be poor.
